

**LOCAL STUDENT NAMED DATASEAM SCHOLAR
AT KENTUCKY CENTER GOVERNOR'S SCHOOL FOR THE ARTS**

Following summer program, sixteen computers awarded to Local High Schools

Louisville, KY – Johnson County student Claire Johnson, Union County student Robert Rowley, Elliott County Student Alexandra Conley and Hancock student Lathan Vargason recently returned from three remarkable weeks at The Kentucky Center Governor's School for the Arts (GSA) in Lexington, and he came back with four new iMac computers for Union County High School. Robert was at GSA studying in their Vocal Music program, and he was singled out for his talent and dedication.

They so impressed everyone that he was named one of four Dataseam Scholars at GSA. Dataseam, a unique Kentucky company that provides computers to school districts in coal counties, donated the state-of-the-art computers for use by GSA's New Media students, and now they'll be coming home to Union County with Robert.

G. Henry Hunt, COO of Dataseam, hopes the computers will inspire other students to accomplish the kinds of things Robert has done. "These students are a great example of world class excellence in our state. Programs like GSA encourage our most creative young people to excel, and they deserve every tool for succeeding in a modern, digital world," Hunt said.

Carrie Nath, Executive Director of GSA, was delighted that the computers would impact students beyond GSA. "Young minds are artistic, imaginative minds," she said. "These computers helped open up a world of creative exploration for our students, and I'm thrilled that they will continue doing that for even more students in the future."

Since its inception in 2004, Dataseam has provided more than 15,000 computers to 48 school districts in coal producing counties. The school district computers are linked together into one of the world's largest computing grids to support cutting-edge cancer research at the University of Louisville's James Graham Brown Cancer Center.
